

- A church based on a covenant relationship with God and with one another, where seeking the mind of Christ is the basis of all that is done
- A church where all members are considered equal before God, and all skills and giftings are valued and recognised

Services are now taking place in the church building for those who wish to attend in person, and are live on Zoom at the same time for those who are unable to attend in person.



I'm so pleased to be able to report that Pub Theology has restarted after 18 months when it wasn't possible to hold our sessions.

We have now held 2 sessions in The Prince Rupert with a healthy attendance of people from various churches in the town and people who attend none.

Pub Theology is all about meeting up somewhere comfortable, having a drink if you'd like (mine's a pint) and talking about some of the Big Questions that (if we are human) we ought to be interested in and have a point of view on. It's for people of all faiths and none - the more different points of view are represented the better it will work.

Here are a few of the questions we have looked at over the last 2 sessions:

- Should Covid vaccinations be compulsory for some people and if so for whom?
- Is it OK to hold a beer festival in a church/graveyard? Why, or why not?
- In Texas abortion is now illegal after 6 weeks. There is no exception for rape or incest. In the UK a foetus with Down's Syndrome may be aborted up until birth. What is an appropriate law on abortion?
- Why is child abuse such a problem in Christian churches?
- What's to be done about starvation in Afghanistan?

If you're interested in thinking about questions like these and would like to come along, our next meeting (after the Christmas break) will be on Thursday 27th January 2022 from 7.30pm at The Prince Rupert.

Greetings from Mark and I, I don't know about you but we have gone back to 'normal' in our daily lives, but it doesn't quite seem the same. People spoke about the opportunity to re-set their lives and re-assess their priorities. I wonder how many of us have grasped that opportunity and fought against the battle to just fall back into the same old routines. It feels that the once you get back onto the treadmill it takes all your effort to just keep upright and running.

I would hope that you still have the chance to assess your priorities. We have moved back into the building for worship but run a hybrid format with both people in the building and people still on zoom. We have continued to look at our manifesto, our statements of intent, and the priorities that we felt during lockdown. Like many we realised that people are the important thing in our lives and relationships matter more than things. Part of that is our relationship with God. Turning up on Sunday, putting money in the offertory, doing 'stuff' is ok but if it's not as a response to our relationship why are we doing any of it. It is also about being willing to admit when we feel our relationship needs to improve, Jesus never condemned people doubts, this past 18 months have been really difficult, but surely a loving God is willing for us to come to Him with our struggles and questions and to sometimes accept we don't have an answer, we need to trust in God.

We have been focusing on the way that Jesus reacted and interacted with the people society had pushed to the outskirts, women, young people, those who break the law or who choose to challenge unjust laws. We, as a fellowship, have made the commitment to reach out to those on the edges of society and to welcome them. Some of the things we are starting reflect this. You will see in other parts of this envoy that we have started things and continue other activities. As I

write, COP 26 is going on. We have achieved the bronze EcoChurch award and are looking to go further and look towards the silver award. I suppose in many ways it is all about taking the log out of our own eyes before we comment on the speck in others'.





Bible Book Club



Our most recent session on 'Unapologetic' by Frances Spufford looked at chapters 5 and 6.

Several of us thought that Chapter 5, which is effectively a re-telling of the story of the life of Jesus, was wonderful. Indeed I'd go as far as saying that if you wanted an introduction to the figure of Jesus it would be better to lead someone to read this chapter rather than one of the gospels. It's exciting, it's spellbinding, it's challenging and it convinces you that Jesus had an amazing new way of looking at the world to

teach us about. Here are a couple of short quotes:

"the implication of (Jesus's) perfectionism is that everybody is guilty; and if everybody is guilty, nobody gets to congratulate themselves, and murders and adulterers can't be shunned."


"he seems weirdly unbothered about in sex...he hardly has a thing to say about it. He expresses absolutely no opinions whatever about homosexuality, abortion, promiscuity, contraception, clerical celibacy, virginity at marriage, modest dress, non-procreative sex, masturbation, gay marriage or how far you should go on a first date."

Strange then that these topics are the subject of so much concern to many branches of the church. It might be better if we concentrated on loving one another and seeking justice – things which Jesus did have a little to say about!

Two very different films to report on since the last edition:

Miss Potter (starring Renée Zellweger) was the story of the acclaimed writer of classic children's books Beatrix Potter. What could have been quite a twee film, complete with Miss Potter talking to the animals that she had drawn (her 'friends'), also covered some real issues such as:

- how a Victorian women could assert her own personality and move from financial reliance on her parents;
- the importance of environmental protection. Beatrix Potter bought 4,000 acres in the Lake District and left it to the National Trust to protect the land scape and rural way of life for generations to follow.

'The Good Liar' starring Helen Mirren and Ian McKellen was a fascinating story with a twist about a conman. It prompted thoughts about:

- Which lies are acceptable and which aren't?
- 'Fake news' on the internet and elsewhere;
- Burning books and censorship of ideas

A highly recommended film.

Recipes

Perky Turkey Soup

Ingredients

1tbsp olive oil

1 large onion, halved and sliced into thin strips

1 red pepper, seeded and sliced into thin strips

2tsp ground coriander

¼ -1/₂tsp chilli flakes

3 tbsp basmati or long-grain rice

1.5 litres/2 pints turkey or chicken stock

250g/9oz cooked turkey meat, cut into thin strips

410g can chickpeas, drained and rinsed

Handful of coriander or flat leaf parsley, roughly chopped

Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the onion and fry for 5 minutes or until it starts to soften.
- Add the red pepper, ground coriander, chilli flakes and rice and stir for about 1 minute.
- Pour in the hot stock, stir in the turkey and chickpeas and season well. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 8-10 minutes, until the vegetables and rice are tender.
- 4. Stir in the fresh coriander/parsley and serve.

Christmas Mincemeat Muffins

Makes 12 medium sized muffins

Ingredients

1¾ cups of self raising flour

3/4 cup caster sugar

½tsp salt

2 eggs

½ cup sour cream

½ cup milk

½tsp rum, whisky or brandy essence

½ cup fruit mincemeat

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C
- 2. Measure the first three ingredients into a large bowl.
- 3. In another bowl mix together, with a whisk, until smooth, the eggs, sour cream, milk and essence of your choice.
- 4. Without overmixing add the liquids to the dry ingredients.
- 5. Coat muffin pans with non-stick spray and half fill the 12 pans with the mixture.
- 6. Using a dampened teaspoon, make a small indentation on the top of each, and into it put 1-2 teaspoons of the fruit mincemeat.
- 7. Cover each with a spoonful of the remaining mixture trying to cover the 'enclosed' mincemeat.
- 8. Bake in the oven for 12-15 minutes or until golden brown. The centres should spring back when pressed.

Thanks to the amazing generosity of our donors our warehouse is currently well stocked but there are a few items we would like:



Dear Mr Taylor,

Welcome to this latest update from Nakonde, the community in Zambia where Matildah lives!

As we are experiencing ourselves, the ongoing impact of coronavirus continues to affect lives in different ways. In Zambia, lockdown measures have recently been eased, following a brief reintroduction of restrictions during the summer.

But earlier this year when restrictions were eased, coupled with following strict protocols to protect the health and wellbeing of the children, <u>my colleagues in Zambia were able to collect a message from Matildah, which I am very pleased to be enclosing today!</u> I hope this provides some reassurance and joy.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued patience and generous commitment during these particularly challenging times. I am also pleased to be sharing this story of change from Nakonde – these successes are only possible thanks to the partnership between you and the communities in Nakonde.

No longer going to school hungry

Due to restrictions that were imposed across the country to reduce the spread of Covid-19, many parents struggled to earn enough money to feed their children properly. This meant, when children returned to school in September, after schools having been closed since March, they were unable to concentrate on their lessons because they were hungry.

But thanks to our wonderful child sponsors like you, we were able to provide food parcels to over 1,000 vulnerable families, ensuring children like Ireen, Luck and Mercy had a nutritious breakfast before going to school.
