There are three principles:

- A church where Christ is the head, with no external hierarchy
- A church based on a covenant relationship with God and with one another, where seeking the mind of Christ is the basis of all that is done
- A church where all members are considered equal before God, and all skills and giftings are valued and recognised

Services are now taking place in the church building for those who wish to attend in person, and are live on Zoom at the same time for those who are unable to attend in person. Services on the second Sunday of each month are held on Zoom only.

- The average age of those attending is coming down significantly

Now of course a lot of this isn't down to me, but I think all those involved with our church can be pleased with the progress that is being made. I like to think that we are in a much stronger position now than we were a few years ago. For a small group of people we achieve a huge amount.

But the key thing is to keep moving forward.

Some of the things I want us to think about in the year to come are:

- Making a formal declaration of our inclusivity as a church, particularly regarding the LGBT+ communities;
- Exploring the possibility of starting a Fresh Expression of Church perhaps a pub church – not on a Sunday (this would be different to Pub Theology which will continue)
- I want to write a short booklet outlining my understanding of the Christian Faith that might form the basis of a training course. You'll be aware that I don't always follow traditional thinking in my faith.
- To move forward consideration of making the main church a more flexible (and comfortable) meeting space.

Thanks to you all for your support. There are exciting times ahead.

By the way, and in case you were wondering, I have still got a job.



Bible Book Club

As Christmas approaches we have turned to an Advent book by Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York, called Walking Backwards to Christmas. The older ones among us might recognise the title as being a song by The Goons.

The book takes an interesting approach to the Christmas story. It starts with the infant Jesus being brough to the Temple and the reaction of the Priestess Anna to meeting the Messiah she has been waiting for. It then goes back in time through



a total of 11 people's stories, including Mary, Joseph, one of the Kings and one of the Shepherds, but also Herod, Rachel, whose son was killed by Herod's troops, and the Innkeepers wife.

It ends right back in the Old Testament with Moses. We're only halfway through and it will be interesting to see how the story develops though to the end of the book.

It's proving a very interesting read. I'll make sure a copy of the book is in our ever-expanding church library.

One of the great things about Bible Book Club is the variety of people who attend our monthly discussions. As well as people from our church we have viewpoints from Church of England, Catholic, Methodist, and unaffiliated people, all of whom bring their own insights and which results in us all developing in our faith. We try to choose books that are fairly accessible to read – we don't go in for heavy theological texts. I really look forward to our monthly chats. We do have some really interesting discussions (and the occasional laugh) while learning a lot.

Harvest Festival Success

This year, London Road Congregational Church and the Just Sing Choir joined forces to make the 2023 Harvest Festival a great success. Together they collected 93.25kgs of food for Newark Food Bank. It was a tremendous effort and a big thanks goes out to everyone involved.

The Trussell Trust runs our foodbank, taking recommendations from health care professionals such as health visitors, staff at local schools and social workers. The scheme works through a voucher scheme, where a provision of three days of nutritionally balanced non-perishable food can be given to those in need.

Volunteers work in the warehouse where deliveries of donated food can be received on a Monday morning. The local warehouse is located in Balderton where the pressure on them to be able to supply this much needed lifeline grows each week. Also, through the foodbank advice is available on other ways families can support themselves, such as the use of "Top-up electricity cards". Other agencies can provide information on a wide variety of issues, including ideas on balancing home income and expenditure.

Shops, schools, churches and individuals make regular donations to help the food bank meet the enormous demand put on them. As we are all aware, the cost of food has risen sharply over the last twelve months, and this in turn has meant that the warehouse often runs low on donations, so help is needed more than ever.

The pickup point for food is now located at 21 Cartergate in Newark, with another foodbank located in Tuxford. Opening times are Tuesday 3 to 5pm and Friday 1 to 3pm.

This year's Harvest Festival was a great success, however, within a few days of the delivery of food, most, if not all, would have been distributed.

The members of London Road Congregational Church will continue to collect food for and deliver to the food bank, and if you would like to contribute through the church, we will be happy to receive your gifts.

Equally, there are many other ways to support this life saving, life changing charity, most supermarkets and food stores will help you to do so. Those in need live amongst us and while we cannot turn our backs on the millions of starving people throughout the world, we should never forget that our neighbours may also be in great need of help.

YOUV'E DONE WHAT?

Well, we have started a Men's Group. It's open to all men living in the Newark area, and you are very welcome.

For quite a while now male members from both London Road Congregational Church and Charles Street Methodist Church have been thinking about starting a Men's Group. All sorts of ideas as to how it might work, where meetings would be held, and at what time of day we would meet, were suggested. At the heart of such a group there was a desire for it to have a Christian ethos, but we didn't want it to be another Bible study or prayer group, we wanted something much wider in its outlook.

Eventually we produced the idea of a Men's Breakfast meeting, held once a month on a Saturday. It would start at 9am and be for no longer than an hour and a half. This way all those attending would still be able to enjoy the normal round of Saturday activities, such as shopping, gardening, and going to the local tip!

We are planning to have a wide range of activities, including guest speakers, conversations, and general fellowship, but at its heart is a desire for the meetings to be a space where men of faith, and indeed no faith, can come together and enjoy each other's company.

Our last meeting was on 11th November where we welcomed our first guest speaker, Rebecca Fawcett from the Newark Open Door Team. She brought along items from the Newark Resources Centre and looked at the town's role during WW1.

Our next meetings are on 9th of December, "Xmas Traditions" led by Mark Taylor, 20th of January "A step back in time", by re-living Christmas gifts from our childhood, 17th February & 16th March. All these meetings will be at London Road Congregational Church, usually in the hall, though as we begin to grow this venue may change in the future.

The group is open to all men of all ages, you don't need an invite to attend, simply come along. However, it would be helpful to know if you are coming so that we can plan the catering and know about dietary requirements, we do ask for donations towards the cost of the food. Simply email Richard on ricthevic53@gmail.com and use the heading "Men's Group" this way we will have an idea of numbers and what you can/cannot eat.

Pub Theology

I thought it might be time to remind people what Pub Theology is all about.

The most important thing to say about it is that it isn't a Christian activity. It's open to those of all faiths and no faith at all and the more different views on faith that are represented the better. We have pagan, atheist and Odinist attendees as well as all shades of Christian belief. No-one will try to convert you!

Then what happens is:

- I'll provide a list of questions etc as conversation starters.
- We talk to each other, say what we think, ask each other questions.
- We have a drink
- We have a good time.
- We all go home a little wiser and understanding other points of view a little better.

The topics for discussion at our most recent meeting were:

- A restaurant in London is selling steaks for £750. Foodbank use is at its highest level ever. Is there something wrong with a society where both these things are true?
- Our prisons are full. Do we need more prisons or less prisoners?
- When I was teaching at a state comprehensive I often said to my pupils that the most dangerous word in the world is "credo" [I Believe in Latin]. It is being demonstrated now without a doubt.' – Letter to the Sunday Times (22nd October 2023) Is it? (in relation to the Israel Hamas war)
- Other than The Bible (or equivalent religious text) if you could read only one book for the rest of your life what would it be?

As you can see they are questions you can have a point of view on without any knowledge of faith – let alone theology. But if you have a faith that's likely to influence your views.

We always find that there are different opinions about everything we discuss – and that's where the fun is. Other people might see things differently to us, and when we listen to them we might change our minds. Alternatively outlining our own views might make us think them through more clearly.

If you are interested in discussing topics similar to this all you need to do is turn up at The Prince Rupert at 7.30pm on the last Thursday of the month (except in December), go up the stairs and you'll find us. There's no charge – except for the fine range of drinks that The Prince Rupert provides.





ActionAid Update

London Road Congregational Church has started sponsoring a child called Alagie Techno from Niamina West in The Gambia. Alagie was born in 2015 and speaks Mandinka, one of the many languages spoken in Niamina West. He goes a local primary school, which is a 10 to 30-minute walk from his home. His family has access to a small piece of land where they can grow crops, and they keep livestock such as chickens, goats and sheep for a source of food and income.



While primary education is compulsory and free in The Gambia, many parents struggle to cover the extra costs of uniforms, materials and exam fees. These hidden fees mean that dropout rates are high and many children fail to complete their basic education.

The Gambia is one of Africa's smallest and most densely populated countries—a strip of land just 15 miles wide in some places and surrounded by Senegal. In recent years communities have experienced countless challenges; drought, heavy rain and floods have damaged people's homes, their farmland, livestock and crops, leading to severe food shortages that affect women and children the most.

ActionAid is working in Niamina West in partnership with families like Alagie's to increase school investment, improve access to food and develop livelihood opportunities.
